Oskar Eustis is the Artistic Director of The Public Theater and has worked as a director, dramaturg, and artistic director for theaters around the country. He has been Resident Director and Dramaturg (1981-86) and Artistic Director (1986-89) at the Eureka Theatre Company in San Francisco, Associate Artistic Director at L.A.'s Mark Taper Forum (1989-94), and Artistic Director at Trinity Repertory Company in Providence, Rhode Island (1994-2005). In 2005 he took the helm at The Public. Throughout his career, Mr. Eustis has been dedicated to the development of new plays as both a director and a producer. He has directed the premieres of Paula Vogel's THE LONG CHRISTMAS RIDE HOME (Elliot Norton Award for Outstanding Production).
